



**How do I apply?**

The Rolling and Responsive mini grant application is available at all Organizers and Allies general meetings and can also be found on Cleveland Neighborhood Progress' website at <http://www.ClevelandNP.org/OandA>

**Who is eligible for a mini grant?**

Rolling and Responsive mini grants are awarded to any Cleveland group who has partnered with a community development corporation fiscal agent. The mini grants must be used for projects that benefit the community—they cannot be used for personal gain. A contract must be signed by both the grantee and the fiscal agent, showcasing the conditions of the relationship between grantee and fiscal.

**Grant Details**

The maximum amount for a mini grant is \$250. Money must be spent within 4 months of being awarded. Grant seekers must apply with a Cleveland community development corporation serving as the fiscal agent. A small final report will be required including pictures.

**When is the application deadline?**

Applications are due by the end of the Organizers and Allies general meeting day or the first Thursday of the month on EVEN months (February, April, June, August, October, and December). **Who reviews the application?**

The Organizers and Allies mini grant committee will review the applications. Final approval will come from Cleveland Neighborhood Progress.

**When should a mini grant seeker expect a decision on their application?**

Decisions will be issued by the end of the 3rd week of each application month. Checks be mailed to the fiscal agent at the end of the month, for a total time of one month from application being submitted to funding.

**What do you look for in a good mini grant project?**

We look for projects that allow people to work together and have an immediate, positive impact on the community. To encourage widespread cooperation, your project should be led and planned by more than one resident. It should be a team effort that involves people from diverse backgrounds. Projects should also work to build relationships and strengthen relationships within the neighborhood.
